
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
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Spotlight on Harriet!

Irvine Global Village Festival

On Saturday, October 14th, SCLC had an exhibition booth at the annual Irvine Global Village Festival, at the Great Park in Irvine. The IGVF is a celebration of people, culture, food, arts, music, and more from around the world. It is hosted annually by the city of Irvine, which bills it as the premier international celebration in Orange County; this year they expected more than 25,000 visitors! A target-rich environment for us!

The SCLC booth displayed samples of our ESL materials, many large photos of our classes, a very large map showing the location of all our Centers, and international candies (which were gone by the end of the day!). The pictures and maps were mounted on tall, sturdy wooden dividers loaned to us from the Center at Voyagers Bible Church.

Our booth was open for business for the entire time of the festival, 10:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m.. Throughout, we had at least 2 SCLC volunteers on-hand to talk to visitors, and we had a steady stream! Some were interested for themselves, others on behalf of family members or friends. Ten or more SCLC students stopped by, as did a similar number of tutors. Many familiar and happy faces to greet!

We also went out to our students! The International Pavilion was near us, so we stopped by, SCLC flyers in hand. We talked to a leader or two in each of the booths present, representing OC communities of Turks, Iranians, Indians, Sudanese, Palestinians, Sikhs, Chinese, Mexicans, Taiwanese, Koreans, Japanese, Syrians, Pakistanis, Qataris, and Kurds (who at the time were dancing up a storm!). We had a positive reception and interest from everyone we talked to, and a few returned the favor, visiting our booth in turn to learn more.

Our objective was to recruit new students, new tutors, and even new Centers. People could indicate interest on-line or on paper. Within a day or two, our website had received about 130 visits; a record! And to date, about 20 indicated interest in being a student, and 10 in being a tutor. No potential new Centers have come forward, as of yet.

Many thanks to the planning team: Laura Casellas, Joan Nadeau, Barbara Looney, Cat Ailanjian, Jim Gustafson, and Judith Slotsky, and to those who helped man our booth: Keri Comer, Harriet Kelly, Micky Hoegh, Pat Heilig, Ilene Bradberry, Sharon Miller, and student G! This was our first time at the Irvine Global Village Festival, and we all agreed it will not be our last!

Website Wonders!

Our <u>SCLC Tutor Tools</u> page on our website includes each month's current issue of Easy English News (EEN). If you have ever used the paper version of EEN in your classroom, you know what a valuable teaching tool it is, and the website version has all of the same features.

The website version also comes with audio recordings of the main articles in the current issue. Your students can read along as the audio clips play. This "dual-modality" teaching method may help improve your students' comprehension and reading skills, and it serves as a model for correct pronunciation.

In addition to the audio recordings, which are available with one click on our *SCLC Tutor Tools* page, a featured video is posted, which starts with one tap from you. If you are able to display a video in your in-person class, it is a fun and engaging activity. (If you do not have access to a projector, SCLC has a projector you may borrow.) If you are online, of course, you need only start the video and then use Share Screen from Zoom to display it to your entire group.

Aside from the specific article audio and video features, EEN provides links to several more videos that supplement the written articles. This list of video links is also posted on the website, so that you have easy access to them. Choose one or two videos and delight your students!

As for direct tutor resource materials, EEN provides a comprehensive Teacher's Guide each month as well as cloze exercises, a crossword puzzle, a vocabulary list, questions and answers related to the articles, and suggestions for conversations.

The *SCLC Tutor Tools* page requires a password since only SCLC volunteers are allowed access to it. If you need the password, see your Center Director, or contact me (Sandy Williams) at Info.southcoastlit@gmail.com.

If you have never explored the EEN on our website, I encourage you to do so. You will become a huge fan!


SCLC 2022-2023 Statistics

A huge *CONGRATULATIONS* is due to all SCLC volunteers! Our statistics for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2023, are in, and they tell a terrific story!

Active SCLC volunteers number 150, and we have worked with 760 English Language Learner adults throughout South Orange County. Last fiscal year, SCLC volunteers donated 6,281 hours of English instruction and 4,289 hours of other volunteer hours, for a grand total of 10,570 hours of unpaid service to our community. We explain what we do on our website in these words:

"As our students acquire English proficiency, they can become active and helpful participants in the community. Importantly, they are also empowered to live their personal lives with greater confidence and success. As ability and confidence increase, our students can participate fully in their own economic endeavors, their education, their health care, and their children's futures. In sum, the entire community benefits from our efforts."

Center Locations Update

SCLC *lost* one center this Fall; the one held at St. Paul's Episcopal Church in Tustin led by Jan Miles. That center focused on citizenship classes for several years, and now the Tustin Adult School holds their own classes there. We are sorry to lose them and thank the tutors who were there so long.

SCLC *gained two* new centers, one of which started with a bang in September at *Saddleback Church Rancho Capistrano*. This new center had 22 students to start, then 41 the next week, and 8 more the next week after that! A Turkish student and a Vietnamese student drive there from Irvine, and some Hispanic students go all the way from Santa Ana and Lake Forest.

The classes held at this branch of Saddleback Church are led by Center Director Ilene Bradberry and her team, including four tutors, two volunteers who help with student intake, and Ilene's husband and a friend who help set up. Ilene was a leader in Saddleback's ESL program back when they were part of our council a few years ago, and we are happy to have her and this program back with us!

Arbor Christian Fellowship Church in Lake Forest was also accepted into SCLC's family of ESL centers at the September board meeting. Jim Baldwin, Center Director there, told board members the church held ESL classes for 30 years before Covid struck and the classes stopped. Jim is now looking forward to resuming classes in January with new tutors in place. Time Management for Students

The *Pomodoro Technique* is a time management method developed in the late 1980s by an Italian student, Francesco Cirillo. He found that he could focus more effectively on his studies when he broke them down into shorter intervals, and he used a kitchen timer shaped like a tomato (*pomodoro* in Italian) to track his time, traditionally 25 minutes in length, separated by short breaks. Each interval is known as a pomodoro. After four pomodoros, the user is advised to take a longer break.



How can ESL students use the Pomodoro Technique?

The Pomodoro Technique can be very effective to help students:

- Focus more effectively on their studies
- Avoid distractions
- Improve their time management skills
- Reduce stress and anxiety
- ♦ Increase their motivation

To use the Pomodoro Technique to study English, ESL students can follow these steps:

- 1. Choose a task they want to work on, such as reading an English article, completing an English grammar exercise, or practicing speaking English.
- 2. Set a timer for 25 minutes.
- 3. Work on the task until the timer goes off.
- 4. Take a short break of 5-10 minutes.
- 5. Repeat steps 2-4 until the task is complete.
- 6. After four pomodoros, take a longer break of 15-30 minutes.

Here are some additional tips for ESL students using the Pomodoro Technique:

- Choose tasks that are specific and measurable. For example, instead of saying "study for English," say, "read one article from the New York Times."
- Break down large tasks into smaller, more manageable tasks. For example, if you are writing an English essay, break it down into tasks such as brainstorming ideas, outlining the essay, writing the introduction, writing the body paragraphs, writing the conclusion, and editing the essay.
- Eliminate distractions during your pomodoros. This means turning off your phone, closing your email, and finding a quiet place to work.
- Take breaks when you need them. If you are frustrated or losing focus, take a short break and return to the task later.
- Reward yourself for completing pomodoros. This could be something simple, such as taking a stretch break, getting a snack, or watching a funny video.

The Pomodoro Technique can be a very effective way for ESL students to study English. It is a simple but powerful technique that can help students to improve their focus, time management skills, and motivation.
