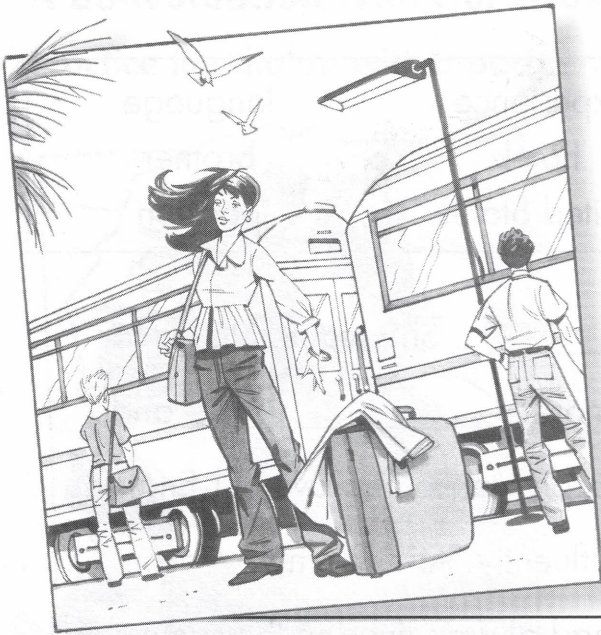


Chapter 1 Three Reasons
